

or those of you who know Randy, Randy brings a particular zest for life and humour, even while facing death. To Randy, this is simply another adventure. It is my great honour to introduce Dylan, Logan and Chloe's dad, Jai's husband, and my very dear friend, Dr. Randy Pausch. [applause]



### RANDY PAUSCH:

[responding to a standing ovation] Make me earn it. [laughter]
It's wonderful to be here. What they didn't tell you is that this lecture series used to be called the Last Lecture. If you had one last lecture to give before you died, what would it be? I thought, damn, I finally nailed the venue and they renamed it. [laughter] So, you know, in case there's anybody who wandered in and doesn't know the back story, my dad always taught me that when there's an elephant in the room, introduce them.

If you look at my CAT scans, there are approximately 10 tumours in my liver, and the doctors told me 3-6 months of good health left. That was a month ago, so you can do the math. I have some of the best doctors in the world. Microphone's not working? Then I'll just have to talk louder. [Adjusts mic] Is that good? All right. So that is what it is. We can't change it, and we just have to decide how we're going to respond to that. We cannot change the cards we are dealt, just how we play the hand. If I don't seem as depressed or morose as I should be, sorry to disappoint you. [laughter] And I assure you I am not in denial. It's not like I'm not aware of what's going on. My family, my three kids, my wife, we just decamped. We bought a lovely house in Virginia, and we're doing that because that's a better place for the family to be, down the road. And the other thing is I am in phenomenally good health right now. I mean it's the greatest thing of cognitive dissonance you will ever see is the fact that I am in really good shape. In fact, I am in better shape than most of you. [Randy gets on the ground and starts doing push-ups] [Applause] So anybody who wants to cry or pity me can get down and do a few of those, and then you may pity me. [laughter] All right, so what we're not talking about today, we are not talking about cancer, because I spent a lot of time talking about that and I'm really not interested. If you have any herbal supplements or remedies, please stay away from me. [laughter] And we're not going to talk about things that are even more important than achieving your childhood dreams. We're not going to talk about my wife, we're not talking about my kids. Because I'm good, but I'm not good enough to talk about that without tearing up. So, we're just going to take that off the table. That's much more important. And we're not going to talk about spirituality and religion, although I will tell you that I have achieved a deathbed conversion. [dramatic pause] ... I just bought a Macintosh. [laughter and clapping] Now I knew I'd get 9% of the audience with that ... All right, so what is today's talk about then? It's about my childhood dreams and how I have achieved them. I've been very fortunate that way. How I believe I've been able to enable the dreams of others, and to some degree, lessons learned. I'm a professor, there should be some lessons learned and how you can use the stuff you hear today to achieve your dreams or enable the dreams of others. And as you get older, you may find that "enabling the dreams of others" thing is even more fun. So what were my childhood dreams? Well, you know, I had a really good childhood. I mean, no kidding around. I was going back through the family archives, and what

was really amazing was, I couldn't find any pictures of me as a kid where I wasn't

smiling. And that was just a very gratifying thing. [Shows slides] There was our dog, right? Aww, thank you. And there I actually have a picture of me dreaming. I did a lot of that. You know, there's a lot of wake up's! I was born in 1960. When you are 8 or 9 years old and you look at the TV set, men are landing on the moon, anything's possible. And that's something we should not lose sight of - that the inspiration and the permission to dream is huge. So what were my childhood dreams? You may not agree with this list, but I was there. [laughter] Being in zero gravity, playing in the National Football League, authoring an article in the World Book Encyclopedia - I guess you can tell the nerds early. [laughter] Being Captain Kirk, anybody here have that childhood dream. I wanted to become one of the guys who won the big stuffed animals in the amusement park, and I wanted to be an Imagineer with Disney. These dreams are not sorted in any particular order, although I think they do get harder, except for maybe the first one.





ometimes, a person is born with a name that makes him stand out. Such is the blessing bestowed upon baseball player, **GIFT NGOEPE**.


Mpho 'Gift' Ngoepe was signed by the Pittsburgh Pirates in 2008. So far, the South African-born infielder has spent three seasons in the minor league. Born in Randburg, Gauteng, he became the 1st black South African - and the 6th South African - to sign a professional contract. Ngoepe has been around baseball for a great portion of his life; his mother was a clubhouse attendant for the Randburg Mets where his family lived. A member of the South African National Baseball Team at the World Baseball Classic, he was





Apparently, Ngoepe's challenge is figuring out how best to use his talents. Critics claim that he strikes out too often for a player of his calibre. "The ball needs to be hit **by** Ngoepe with more authority," says David Hill. "This will prove he is more than just a speedster with a glove." Ngoepe however set career-highs in games played in 2014 and, in 2015, he was invited **by** Pirates to spring training.

It would be a great story if gifted Ngoepe were to make the major league if only to make good on a promise he made to his mother. Ngoepe believes he can make it. "You've got to have that belief," he says. "Otherwise you're just out there playing a game."


