1] Wheat Field with Crows

Auvers-sur-Oise: July, 1890

This painting has been described as Vincent van Gogh's "suicide note" put to canvas. Can you suggest a reason for this theory?

What in the painting could create a negative or sad impression? NO PEOPLE, CROWS

However, this was not his final painting and it is one of four paintings with the same subject. There are a number of elements in this painting and these can be interpreted as symbolic.

The three **pathways** may suggest the past, present and future. The two corner paths spring from nowhere and lead nowhere; while the middle path may be a dead end, it could also lead beyond the horizon.

Does this tie in with the theory of a "suicide note"? Motivate your answer. YES / NO

A restless sky is a recurring feature of many of Van Gogh's paintings. Stormy weather, while ominous and foreboding, also displays the power and beauty of nature. After a storm everything is clean and fresh, does his fascination with storms have to do with the potential for freedom and renewal? POSSIBLY

The loneliness of the **wheat field** and absence of people could refer to Vincent's state of mind and feelings of abandonment and failure.

What could be the reasons for him feeling abandoned and alone? DEPRESSION

The **crows** are perhaps the most powerful image in this painting.

What would be their significance if they flying towards the painter? HOPE

Does this meaning change if we assume that they are flying away? Explain. DEATH

2] Starry Night Saint-Rémy: June 1889

This is probably the most recognisable of Vincent van Gogh's paintings. It was painted from memory in the asylum due to the severe attacks of depression from which he suffered.

Does this make the emotional effect this painting has any more powerful? YES - LONGING

Is there any resemblance between Wheat Field with Crows and Starry Night when you consider the artist's state of mind and emotional turmoil? YES - ALONE, INNERCONFLICT

Compare the paintings with regard to style, subject, use of colour and brushstrokes. ANY
